









The instrument maker had been working at the observatory longer than any other employe.

Cosh worked with observatory astronomers in making the intricate instruments necessary for accurate observation and recording of astronomical data.

He said the cross-hairs must be fine enough so where the two hairs meet in an X they won't hide a 12th magniture star-one thousands of times dimmer than the brightest star visible to Earth. He also did precision machine-work.

Cosh was trained as a tool and die maker in Scotland. He came
